Yes, I did survive. I was lucky enough to live. And looking back now, I am one of the lucky ones. Though the impacts from this survival, can be felt, and have an impact on my life every day.
My Story, which I chose not to disclose in full today, included a fatality. My husband from whom I had been estranged was shot and killed by my then partner, after yet again tracking me down and finding me.
would like now to give back, to help others who are now experiencing this nightmare.
My concern, remembering being a "victim" is that I would not leave without my dogs. My dogs who were used as a pawn, threatened with horrible deaths. With the unconditional love they gave me, no matter what. I would not leave them to this fate.
f I had no-where to go where I could not take them. I would not leave.
take in animals from families affected by family violence through local agencies, and care for them at no charge until they are able to get housing and have their animals back home with them. It is a huge thing for children especially. Often these animals are handed to the RSPCA
This is played out day to day, every day in the lives of women, and sadly, their children.  There is not enough accommodation for women and children, affected by family violence.  There is much less, if anything, for women and children and their pets.
After my family violence experience, I put myself on the road to recovery. I fought tooth and nail to improve my education, and to improve my life. But always I had my dogs to support me at home.
I am a qualified ; business owner, I am an experienced
Is a new program. It is before the Chief Magistrate as I write this, with the intention of beginning a Pilot Program in the extremely high rate of family Violence. I am awaiting their response.

This purposely trained dog may help agencies in the future, agencies such as CAV, VAS, and possibly Vic Police.

"can help with family violence. She can give children a voice, and a sense of unconditional love and understanding. She has no conditions. She does not judge.

She could walk into a courtroom with unconditional support for the child she represents. A child possibly giving evidence regarding a violent crime against their mother, or siblings.

She could give strength to a single woman, who sits alone, scared.

She could sit quietly, representing Centre against Violence advocates, helping them to help the children remain calm and able to tell their story. Give better evidence as they relive their trauma.

It has been trialled and proven overseas that courtroom dogs have a positive effect in the lives of those traumatised by violent crimes.

"will train these dogs to be comfort animals before, during and after court appearances.

Often it is said that going through the Justice System is reliving the trauma.

" is offering a way to help with that trauma.

Facility dogs are trained to a high level of obedience, such as a service dog is. The difference is that the Facility dog works with many different people, not just one as a service dog would. The facility dogs would be "owned" by an agency and be on call when needed.

I have letters of support from agencies who deal in the "frontline" of domestic violence in our area.

are offering to research and conduct evaluation on this pilot, should we have the permission to go ahead.

I am hoping you can see the positive impact this program could have on people whose lives have been traumatised through violent crimes. And also the positive impact these dogs can have on the people who work in this area. They need unconditional support too.

This has not been done in Australia. I would like to bring this program here and help those in first. Should the pilot prove successful I can expand and help more victims of domestic violence.

the Centre Against Violence is the specialist family violence and sexual assault service provider for the district. A significant part of our advocacy work is in relation to the provision of our support for clients impacted by these crimes. Given the nature of such crimes, much of our ork involves preparing clients to feel safe and as contained as possible when they move through the legal process. There is well documented research that tells us that victims of violent crime often escribe being re-traumatised when accessing the judicial system.
As mentioned in the program brief, the use of a facility dog as an additional support to ur current therapeutic work around safety and containment for clients, would work to compliment is. Anecdotally, I would imagine any opportunity to increase a clients feeling of safety would also enefit them in terms of giving their evidence and work toward a more positive experience of the verall process.
